## 2018 in Review

### Financing for NCDs Dialogue

#### 9-11 April, Copenhagen

- Discussed current landscape of financing for NCDs, potential sources of funding, innovative partnerships, etc.
- Resulted in a <u>high-level summary</u>
- Launch of the *Lancet* Taskforce on NCDs and Economics <u>series</u>
- Ongoing challenge: We know what needs to be done, but the rhetoric has not yet translated into action. Governments and donors are still lagging behind in financing NCDs, and without significant investment, the NCD response will not accelerate at the speed required to meet global goals and targets.

## Third UN High-Level Meeting on NCDs

#### 27 September, UNHQ New York

- Political Declaration <u>adopted</u> some good language on working w/CS, PLWNCDs, but overall weak and lacking ambition
- Agreement on the '5x5' response inclusion of air pollution and mental health
- Civil society mobilised media statements, #enoughNCDs campaign, side events, etc.
- Rising political capital of UHC ahead of the 2019 UN HLM on UHC

#### Challenges

- No financial commitments to the NCD response
- Accountability a missing link
- Civil society statements from the floor were limited
- Unhealthy commodity industries active throughout negotiations and undermined ambitious language in text on WHO Best Buys & other policies
- 7 years until the next HLM in 2025





### First WHO Global Conference on Air Pollution and Health



#### Air pollution: a major cause of disease, silent killer of millions

#### Air pollution is the world's largest single environmental health risk, and a leading risk

factor for NCDs. According to the ViH0, air pollution courses 7 million deaths every year worldwide' Of these deaths, about 80% are from noncommunicable diseasus (NCDs), making the number of NCD deaths, due to air pollution comparable to mortality due to tobacco use's ripolitution regaritively aflotts quality of life for all, and in particular for billions of people around the world living with NCDs.

Every year poor air quality claims 4.2 million lives: from exposure to ambient (outdoor) pollution primarily from industry, agriculture, energy and transport, and 3.3 million from household induor) pollution iargely generated by burning household fuel for cooking, heating and lighting purposes.<sup>3</sup> Air pollution is the fourth highest risk factor for primature deaths – one in 10 death worldwide is atmibutable to air pollution exposure.<sup>6</sup> In 2016, over 90% of the world's oppulation lived in places where the air is unsfer to broathe, according to the World Health Organization's air quality guidelines.<sup>8</sup>



Ambient air pollution alone is responsible for:

- → 24% of all deaths from stroke
  → 25% of all deaths and disease from ischaemic
- heart disease → 29% of all deaths and disease from lung cancer
- → 43% of all deaths and disease from chronic

#### obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD).<sup>3</sup>

There is also increasing evidence for links with other NCDs. The suffering and costs imposed on people, families, communities, businesses and economies are entirely preventable by cleaning up our air.

For these reasons, the UIN has recently recognised air pollution as one of the major risk factors contributing to the massive and growing burden of NCDs worldwide, alongised tobacco, alcohol, unhealthy diet and physical inactivity. The Political Declaration of the thrid UIN High Lowel Meeting on NCDs was signed by Heads of State and Government during the UN General Assembly in Seytomber 2018.

The recognition of air pollution as a major risk: factor should be the starting signal for a new, more urgent policy approach to clean up our air to protect and improve health for all worldwide. #### **UNFCCC COP 24**

- Ongoing in Katowice, Poland, from December 3 to 15
- Negotiations centred on discussion of the 'Paris Rulebook' the implementing guidelines of the <u>Paris Agreement</u>, adopted in 2015 at COP 21
- Central aim of the Paris Agreement is to keep global temperature rise well below 2.0 °C above pre-industrial levels and ideally within 1.5°C. Requests each country to outline and communicate their post-2020 climate actions, known as 'Nationally Determined Contributions' (NDCs).
- Hot topics within negotiation of Paris Rulebook include
  - Financing
  - Transparency
  - Human rights, gender, indigenous peoples



#### **UNFCCC COP 24: Health in the Dialogue**

- Health discussions at COP 24 spanned NCDs and co-benefit solutions, as well as impacts on infectious disease, malnutrition, health system adaptation and resilience, and the role of health professionals as advocates
- Key publications launched in advance of and at the meeting
  - Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) special report: the <u>1.5 Health Report</u>: "Any increase in global warming, even an increase by half a degree, could affect human health. Warming of 1.5°C is not considered 'safe' for most nations, communities, ecosystems and sectors and poses significant risks to natural and human systems."
  - 2018 Report of the Lancet Countdown on Health and Climate Change <u>Lancet Paper</u> and <u>accompanying</u> resources: 10 recommendations for action, as well as headline finding that 153 billion hours of labour were lost in 2017 because of heat, an increase of more than 62 billion hours since 2000
  - WHO-led <u>COP 24 Special Report on Health and Climate Change</u>: Meeting the targets of the Paris agreement would be expected to save over one million lives a year from air pollution alone by 2050, and the value of the health gains would be double the cost of the policies - even greater gains if 1.5°C rather than the 2.0 °C target - up to 2.31 trillion USD in China and 8.4 trillion in India.
  - Joint briefing for UNFCCC Negotiators on <u>Incorporating Health into the Climate Regime</u> coordinated by the Global Climate and Health Alliance
- Many instances of health community 'talking to itself', but also examples of wider integration, including in conversations



### **UNFCCC COP 24: Influence of the Industry**

- Strong industry presence stark contrast to tobacco COPs
- COP24's first corporate sponsor was the EU's largest producer of coking coal (JSW), who said the partnership would guarantee "the company's active participation in the event and the possibility of promoting pro-ecological changes in the mining sector"
- <u>US Side Event</u> on new fossil fuel technologies "We strongly believe that no country should have to sacrifice economic prosperity or energy security in pursuit of environmental sustainability" (and similar events by other Member States)
- Wider evidence of parallels to tactics used by big tobacco, big alcohol, and big sugar
- Protests by civil society in the COP 24 venue and in the streets of Katowice
- Lessons can be learned from the NCD response
